Course Summary: This is a first course in mathematical reasoning, largely focusing on reading and writing rigorous mathematical proofs. As such, this is an introduction to the techniques commonly assumed in upper-level, proof-based math courses. Topics include logic, proof techniques, set theory, functions, and cardinality.

Textbook: There are two recommended textbooks for the course: Mathematical Reasoning: Writting and Proof, Version 2.1 by Ted Sundstrom and An Introduction to Mathematical Reasoning, second edition by Matthew Conroy and Jennifer Taggart. Both textbooks are free. You can find links to them on the course website. These are supplementary - the primary materials will be lecture notes provided by the instructor.

Zoom Policies for lectures and office hours: During lectures, keep your microphones muted. Use the chat function in Zoom to ask questions, or if you like, you may unmute and ask a question live. Please keep in mind all of the lectures and office hours are being recorded. Occasionally, if I don't understand a question, I may ask you to unmute and clarify (or clarify in the chat). If you would like to use video, please do - this always helps the instructor. However, there is no policy requiring that you keep videos on. During office hours, you can unumute your microphone and ask questions. If there ends up being too many people, I may ask every to mute their microphones and utilize the chat feature. Also, please be courteous. If you ask a question, please ask follow-up questions if you need. However, if you find the answer is satisfactory, please give others an opportunity to ask a question before you ask another.

Academic Honesty: To receive a grade in the course, you will be required to sign an academic honesty pledge. A record of the pledge will be kept on Gradescope.

Homework: Each week, beginning the second week of the class, you will turn in a written homework assignment via Gradescope. This portion of your homework will generally be due at 11:59pm on Wednesday, although specific dates may fluctuate. **No extensions will be given to anyone for any reason.** However, you may miss up to 20% of the total of homework points available for the quarter without penalty to your grade.

Canvas Quizzes: You will have weekly Canvas quizzes beginning Monday, June 28. Canvas quizzes will be short multiple choice, True / False, or short answer type questions intended only to test whether or not you understand the basic logic, definitions, theorems, and techniques taught in the lectures. Each quiz will cover material from the prior week's lectures. There will be no make-up quizzes, however, you may miss up to 10% of the total Canvas quiz points without penalty to your grade.

Written Quizzes: There will be three timed, in-class, written quizzes given throughout the quarter. These quizzes will be held during class time. If you cannot attend these three classes (see dates below), please look for another Math 300 course that better suits your schedule. For each of these written quizzes, you will need to upload your solutions to Gradescope before the deadline. Late uploads will be penalized via point deductions. Some quizzes may end up being open-book. If this is the case, a policy for the quiz will be provided before the quiz. There will be no make-up quizzes, however, the lowest of your first two quizzes will be dropped. Each of the remaining two will comprise 10 % of your course grade.

Oral Quizzes: You will be required to take one oral quiz during the last week of the course. You will need to pick an available time listed on the course website and email the Instructor to reserve that time slot. The oral quizzes will be held over Zoom, and will include only you and the instructor. You will be asked to describe in words how you would prove a given statement or two. A week before oral quizzes start, you will be provided a rubric. There will be no make-up oral quizzes.
